Summary of Curriculum Policy

The curriculum reflected the aims and objectives of our school and conformed to the statutory requirements of the Education Reform Order (NI) 1989 and the 2007 Education Order.

2. Principal's Report

Staff

During 2017-8, P6 and P7 were taught by permanent teachers and P5 had a temporary teacher for the year. P2 class teacher went on maternity leave and the temporary teacher started her maternity leave after Easter. Industrial Action continues to have an impact on the implementation of new initiatives and in the organisation of meetings after 3 O'clock. In-service training was held mainly during School Development Days.

Teaching and Learning

Communication:

- Most teachers are developing a different writing type e.g narrative, report, procedural, each half term and developing their plans accordingly.
- Children are exposed to modelled and shared writing before being asked to write by themselves, which gives them a much clearer understanding of what is expected. This has had an impact on the quality of their own writing. As the plans are further developed next year there will be clearer evidence of modelled, shared, guided and independent writing across the school.
- Tasks show that the children have been writing for a variety of purposes and audiences.
- Collegiate Book Discussions highlighted the greater use of Assessment for Learning strategies in Literacy during the school year.
- In the classes where the line of progression of Assessment for Learning strategies is being followed the children are using success criteria for peer and self-assessment. All teachers need to ensure that the Assessment for Learning strategies are promoted consistently. These need to be embedded next year.
- The Linguistic Phonics Spelling Scheme was introduced in January 2018. It is embedded into classroom and homework in P2 -7. Pupils who have struggled with the phonics have returned to the old spelling scheme.
- Literacy Policy, Learning and Teaching Policy and Marking for Improvement updated and ratified by BoG.
- Data: All classes tested have a mean score above the equivalent CAT score. With the exception of only one cohort, all classes have a mean score above 110 and have significantly improved their mean score from last year.
- Most pupils are performing well above the national average in all areas. There has been a good increase in all areas except complex inference compared to last year's results.

- Looking at all the Literacy data across the school there is no significant difference between gender or free school meals. However, there is clear evidence that low attendance has a negative impact on scores.
- The Literacy Co-ordinator monitored and evaluated teaching planners, pupils' exercise books and samples/ tasks submitted in cross-curricular skills.

Using Mathematics

- Assessment for Learning strategies (AfL) are not being used consistently across all Key Stages.
- Collegiate Book Discussions highlighted the greater use of Assessment for Learning strategies in Mathematics during the school year.
- Our Pupil Voice indicated increased awareness and use of Assessment for Learning strategies across KS2.
- A Line of progression and Marking for Improvement Policy was developed to support embedding of Assessment for Learning strategies.
- Collegiate Book Discussions demonstrated an increased focus on crosscurricular links in Using Mathematics.
- Class topic webs highlighted natural links across the curriculum and in particular Using Mathematics.
- Measures was the whole school focus with full coverage of all areas in Measure. Audit highlighted the need for resources to be purchased and greater hands on support during practical activities.
- Fluency in Facts and Procedures was a whole school focus which highlighted the need for upskilling staff and a timetabled period of Number Talk in KS2.
- Using Maths Policy, Teaching and Learning Policy and Marking for Improvement updated and ratified by BoG.
- Data P4-7: 4 pupils made lower than expected progress and 110 made expected or greater than expected progress. Progress Test in Mathematics Scores are rising for the majority of pupils.
- Most classes are above the National Average in their attainment in Measure, though our school standard could increase.
- PASS scores are rising for some pupils; this will continue to be an area of focus next year.
- The Using Mathematics' Co-ordinator monitored and evaluated teaching planners, pupils' exercise books and samples/ tasks submitted in crosscurricular skills.

Using ICT

- The concept of awarding "levels" is now being embedded amongst the staff who are not following industrial action.
- Pupils are being introduced to more ICT skills which is benefitting pupils' learning, but the children require longer exposure to the software before they become independent of adult support.

- A new **UICT planner** has ensured that staff are planning for UICT. There is a natural progression through the defined competences at each level.
- The Using ICT Co-ordinator monitored and evaluated teaching planners, and samples/ tasks submitted.
- Teachers received **On-line Safety Training** 25th August 2018. E-safety lessons for each class are in Staff -UICT Folder.
- A new, updated and user-friendly website has been created for a total outlay of £132.60. Cedar's Facebook page is showcasing the school and pupils' learning, with nearly 380 regular viewers. Between 9th August- 5th September we reached 1522 people. (Cedar Big Bun Bonanza 1,600, Ecowarriors video 1,300, P7 Camogie 1,200, Cedar Cup 1,800, KS2 Teacher post 10,200, Mud Pie Day 3,100, New Gaelic Strips 1,400, Girls football 2,100 and Snowman comp/ school closures 8,600.)
- Cedar has created a GDPR Time Line detailing changes in school procedures and how we are complying with new data regulations. A GDPR Policy for Cedar IPS and NU and Privacy Notices for Students & Parents/ Families/ Carers, Teachers and Non -teaching staff have been ratified by the BoG. Data Protection Officer- from EA.

Special Educational Needs

- Due to financial constraints, the BoG were no longer able to employ a SENCo (2017-18). Dr Melville was offered a permanent part-time teaching post in P5, a post she later declined in July 2017. In September 2017, The BoG agreed to fund the employment of a Learning Support Assistant to support pupils in F5 and KS1 for 3 days a week. The Principal continued as Acting SENCo.
- There is movement of pupils on and off the **SEN Register** depending on the level of need and the impact of interventions.
- Teachers reviewed targets for pupils on IEP's in October 2017 and February 2018 and Target Pupils termly. SIMS data and teacher judgement identified pupils to target.
- The new IEP format is more user friendly and accountable.
- The new proformas for target pupils have identified areas of need but there is a lack of outside classroom support.
- Teachers identified too many targets for pupils but were limited by the lack of withdrawal support and teachers tried to provide additional support in class.
- Staff availability in 2017-18: Nurture one session each week. Six or seven sessions of support for KS2 a week from FS/KS1 staff. One C/A employed to provide support from 2-3pm.
- Each class has a range of sensory toys appropriate for their age range. Many of these toys were purchased by parents from Cedar's Amazon Wish List. The new Sensory Room will be available for use from September 2018.

- The Acting SENCo liaised with outside agencies, arranged the completion of relevant paperwork and ensured that staff and parents were kept updated regularly.
- GL Baseline Assessment completed with P1 pupils and will continue to be administered next year. Use of MIST for P2. P3-7 will complete PTM/PTE/ PASS/SWST/ NGRT.

Data Analysis/Target Setting

- New format and system implemented from August 2017 more data driven.
- Teachers used a combination of SIMS data, close analysis of PTE/PTM scores and professional dialogue to identify target pupils. Teachers are more aware of needs of class (class target) and individuals class work more focused on specific needs. However, too many targets for pupils to truly engage to be adapted for 2018/19. Progress made for most target pupils.
- Targets were reviewed by teachers (3 times across the year) and evidence of progress recorded using Seesaw.
- Parents and pupils informed of targets in September information sent home on how best to support. Parents enabled to become more engaged and able to support their children's progress.
- Low scoring PASS pupils targeted for the first time to support social and emotional needs.
- Parents introduced to Growth Mindset approach and the associated language at Welcome Meetings in September 2017. Class Dojo 'Growth Mindset' talk homework set during Autumn term by P3-7 classes and a short video watched at home about Growth Mindset. We are beginning to challenge some parents' perceptions of 'how we learn' to ensure that positive and encouraging messages are consistent - especially in maths.
- More pupils adopting Growth Mindset language and attitudes.
- Pupils who were identified as having reading targets tested in NGRT A in September - results passed to class teachers to help inform planning for support.
- P6 and P7 pupils tested using NGRT B in December/January to trial midpoint testing - teachers analysed results and adapted targets as required.
- ullet P4-7 target pupils tested using NGRT C in May all results passed to teachers and MM for analysis.

GL Baseline

 Administered in September 2017 and Baseline Review in June 2018. Results generated and analysed - indicates solid progress made.

CAT4 (Intelligence Test) vs PTE (Progress in English) and CAT4 (Intelligence Test) vs PTM (Progress in Mathematics)

The majority of pupils are making expected, higher or much higher than expected progress. Most classes increased mean score. All classes outperforming CAT scores. Clear progress based on data between 2016/17 and 2017/18.

Target and IEP Pupils identified on stanine charts

- PTM (45 target/IEP pupils) 51% of target/IEP pupils increased by at least one stanine band. 27% maintained previous band. 22% dropped by at least 1 stanine band.
- PTE: Stanine bands across the school- there has been a marked improvement from last year with more children moving from stanine bands 4-6 into bands 7-9. The breakdown of the bands is as follows; 12 children working at stanine bands 2 or 3. This represents 8.4%. There are 70 children are working in stanine bands 4, 5 or 6 which represents 49%. There are 61 children working in stanine bands 7, 8 or 9 which represents 42.6%. There are no children working at stanine band 1. All the children in stanine bands 2 and 3 have been identified as having additional needs and are currently on an IEP or are in the target group for literacy.

PASS Scores

- Analysed individually. Mean scores created for each class to monitor general progress.
- Some classes making good progress, but definite room for improvement.
- Mean calculated for 'feelings about school' and 'learner self-regard' 2017/18 and 2016/17

NGRT

All target pupils in P4, 6 and 7 tested in September. P4, P6 and P7 pupils retested using NGRT C in May 2018. P6 and P7 pupils were trialled using the new test NGRT B in Dec/Jan and used to monitor progress/adapt current targets.

Assessment of Cross Curricular Skills

- Staff not supporting Industrial Action submitted two tasks in Using Maths (Number and Measure), Communication (two different types of writing) and UICT (Film and Animation and one other Desirable Feature). Three samples (Extension, Core, Support). Staff received written feedback. Timings need to be more stringently adhered to by staff.
- Due to on-going industrial action Levels were not submitted to DE.

Other Areas of Learning

Nursery/ Foundation Stage/ Key Stage 1

- All Play Based Learning planners now have learning intentions for malleable work.
- Progression of dough/ clay activities to be tracked in 2108-19.

- Workshops delivered 8.1.18 -34 parents attended (representing 49 pupils). Parent evaluations showed an increase in parent skill. On a Scale 1-10 Parent confidence with **phonics** before the workshop was an average of 5.6 and after the workshop it was an average of 8.9.
 - Parent confidence with **Mental Maths** before the workshop was an average of 5.8 and after the workshop it was an average of 8.8.
- Self and Peer Assessment introduced in FS and well embedded in KS1.
- Tracking pupils' skills through the Seesaw app is inconsistent across the school. Pupils are using the QR Code, and the new WIFI system should eradicate previous issues.
- Learning and Teaching Policy Ratified 18.12.17

Integration and Religion

- Cedar IPS was awarded the Excellence in Integration Award in June and the school was presented with the Award on the 4th October 2017 by Roisin Marshall.
- Cedar was awarded a grant of £3,965.00 from the IEF to assist with the development of our Integration and RE Curriculum for 2017-2018.
- New integrated topics were developed across KS1 and KS2.
- Staff completed integration training facilitated by Dave Thompson.
- CRIS were unable to provide training but Cedar purchased their resources and facilitators resources. (Celebrating Differences (KS1) Programme and Knowing Me, Knowing You (KS2) Programme).
- Cedar's RE Policy was ratified by BoG in December 2017.
- There needs to be greater monitor and tracking of RE planners in 2018-19.
- Cedar's RSE Policy will be finalised after consultation with our stakeholders.
- Cedar was awarded a grant of £3,250.00 from the IEF to assist with the development of our RSE and RE Curriculum for 2018-2019.

World Around Us

- Clear cross-curricular links evidenced in planners with at least 3 pieces of topic work relating to Maths and Literacy per half term. Successful CBD sessions with all staff members and areas for development identified. Peer feedback implemented in KS1 and 2.
- Cross-curricular links are evident in planners- P4-7 successful introduced a topic web planner for each mid-term. Stronger cross-curricular links to mathematics have been established.

Physical Education- Substitute Teacher took on Co-ordinator Role

- Staff received athletics training and new resources costing £458.04 were purchased.
- A new overview of planners highlighted an imbalance in the coverage of core areas of P.E. e.g games, athletics, dance and gymnastics.
- P5-7 completed a block of 6 or 7 swimming sessions annually.

Healthy Kidz was a healthy fitness programme supported by the Down, Mourne and Newry Council which tried to target pupils to engage in more sport.

Music

- Boomwhackers are widely used throughout the school for the area of "Working Creatively."
- Cedar had booked $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours Music tuition from an EA Tutor, costing £1,715.00 a year. With a low uptake of interested pupils and high fall out rate during the year, the decision to book one hour has been taken to keep the provision cost effective.

Primary Languages

 Through Parental donations the school was able to employ a language tutor for two terms for P1-P7. Spanish: Term 1 and French: Term 2.
 Cost-£1.350.00.

Healthy Eating

- Using Welcome Meetings, regular features in the Cedar News and advice on the Parent Section of the school website, parents were encouraged to provide healthy breaks at
- P1 provide Healthy Break.

Whole School Focus

 Specific times were designated to: Anti-Bullying Week, NSPCC Number Day, Mud Pi Day, E-Safety Week, Money Week and Integration Month.

Nursery

- Parent Meetings 16-18th October 2017 & 6th- 8th February 2018.
- Develop links and updates direct to parents through 'See Saw' application. Photos and comments are stored in individual folders for the children on See Saw. These are shared with parents at the two parent meetings held in October and February. Photos are also share informally with parents at the end of sessions.
- 'Getting Ready to Learn' parent workshops were well-received by parents with lots of positive feedback in follow up questionnaires. Funding applied for in April 2018 to run the same three programmes next year. £1,600 received in September 2018. This is the final cycle of funding for this programme.
- Regular Nursery photos & comments are collated and posted on the Cedar website & Facebook page to keep parents updated on the range of activities the children are engaging in.

- Nursery Sing-Along was held on 12th December 2017. This year the sing along was sponsored by parents and we raised over £400 towards the creation of a partition wall to create a story room.
- A new story room wall was installed January 2018. This has created a quiet space for large & small group time and has been of great benefit. The room has been painted in calming colours as an underwater scene by Ms McGrath. Black out curtains have allowed the room to be transformed into a sensory room, which includes a bubble tube, fibre optic & fairy lights, a screen projector, various tactile sensory toys & stepping stones, soft music and an aromatherapy diffuser. This has been an excellent addition to our classroom and creates a safe space for children to relax and regulate their emotions.
- Big Lottery funding was applied for in May 2018. Unfortunately the application was not successful. Feedback as to why we were unsuccessful is to be assessed and we will reapply next year.
- Development of Nursery front garden. New flower beds have been created and planted out. An electric lawn mower has been purchased to maintain the short lawn. Bamboo fencing has been attached to the existing fence and a new pirate ship installed. The garden has been used extensively through the summer term and many parents have commented positively about the changes.
- Nursery Celebration Day 21st June 2018. This was very well attended and feedback was again very positive for this event.

Tuck Shop

Primary 7 successfully organised our annual healthy Tuck Shop during the Summer Term.

Educational Visits

In-school learning was supported by a range of educational visits, including trips to Strangford Lough (P7 - survey), P1-3 Christmas Pantomime Castle Ward - Victorian Day (P7), Belfast Zoo (P2), Titanic Trip (P7), Aunt Sandra's Sweet Shop (P5 & P6), Orienteering in Tobar Mhuir (P7), Down Council (P7), RADAR Belfast (P7) and Kingspan Stadium Visit (P5). The highlight for the older pupils was a 2-day outdoor education programme for Primary 6 organised through Killyleagh OEC and the P7 Residential in Killyleagh OEC (6-9th February 2018).





Cinema Screening: A cinema night was organised in October at Downpatrick Cinema for the film Hocus Pocus. Unfortunately, due to Storm Ophelia the Cinema Night had to be cancelled. Due to a subsequent change of ownership of the Cinema, Parents' Council were unable to rearrange the evening.

Parents' Council then arranged a Cinema afternoon in the hall at Cedar IPS on Sunday 3^{rd} December, showing Arthur Christmas and Elf. A very special visitor took time out of his busy schedule to join the boys and girls at the screening! The cinema afternoon raised a total of £354.00. With plenty of popcorn still available, bags were sold in school on 8^{th} December making an additional £79.00 for school funds.

Halloween Disco: Having received many requests, Parents' Council's first disco of the year was a Halloween Disco. Everyone got their spooky dancing shoes on for a Halloween Boogie and there were some fantastic costumes and scary sights on show!

The disco proved a great success and raised £728.70.

Christmas Disco: On 19th December, the children from Nursery to Primary 3 assembled in the Hall from 6.00 p.m. This was quickly followed by the arrival of Primary 4 to Primary 7 children for their disco at 7.15 p.m. raising a fantastic £605.50. Thanks to our resident DJ's Rory Kerr and Pearse Cullen (past pupils).

Christmas Raffle: A major part of the Parents' Council fund-raising calendar is the annual Christmas Raffle. The raffle took place in school on 21^{st} December and winners were treated to a host of excellent prizes, generously donated by local businesses, and raised £603.00. The children's hampers raised £184.00 and the raffle at the KS1 production generated £200.

Smarties Tubes: This year each child was given a tube of Smarties to enjoy and then to return the tubes filled with 20p coins. Again, this proved to be a very successful fundraising initiative, raising £850.50.

Sports Active Award

Parents' Council successfully applied to Newry, Mourne and Down Council for a Sports Active Award and were awarded £2,200.00. This ensured that a Healthy Kidz programme could run free of charge over the winter months involving P2, P3, P4 and P5 pupils.

The Easter Class Draws: The annual Easter Raffle was again very well supported. Easter Hampers were available to win in each class and the raffle raised f.332 40.

Bingo Night: It was eyes down for the Easter Bingo Night at Cedar IPS on 27th March. A great turnout ensured this was a successful and social evening. Many thanks to Michael Sheppard for his enthusiastic Bingo Calling, ably helped by pupil volunteers on the night. With prizes and refreshments on offer, the evening raised a total of £236.50.

Recycling: Again, we continued to make use of the onsite-recycling bin, which added to our fundraising total of £309.20 from September to June.

Sponsored Walk: The School Sponsored Walk was held on Friday 18th May at Kilmore Pitches. Each class completed their allocated number of laps and raised an incredible £1788.73.

Non- Uniform Days: Money was donated to two charities and £378.74 raised for school funds.

Pre-Loved Uniforms: Sales of Pre-Loved Uniforms continue to be popular amongst our school family and donations came to £114.50 up to end of June. The rails are now situated most days in the school foyer and we are very grateful to all families who have donated items of uniform.

Holy Communion Tea: Each year the Parents' Council helps organise the Holy Communion Tea. This has been a real privilege to arrange, and it has been wonderful to be part of this special day.

Copper Challenge: The pennies certainly add up when a grand total of £221.80 was raised.

easyfundraising.com: Cedar registered and began to encourage families and friends of Cedar to register and to make donations as they shopped online. In November 2015, we had 19 supporters and had raised a total of £39.95. By June 2016, there were a total of 63 supporters who had raised a grand total of £311.99. By June 2017, we had a total of 78 supporters and raised a total of

£440.27 over the course of 2016-2017. This year, we now have 104 supporters and to date have raised £1115.79.

The P7 Tuck Shop: Each year the Parents' Council has been invited to invest in the P7 Tuck Shop. We were invited to a fantastic power point presentation on their proposed Tuck Shop. It was lovely to see the teamwork involved in such a project, and the professionalism in which it was carried out.
